ISFIELD PARISH COUNCIL

There are two issues that I wanted to address in this report.

The first is the question of the sum of money which will be made available to the village by the developers of Lavender Fields once certain sales targets have been met. I know I have referred to this before, both here and at Parish Council meetings, but I sense that there may still be some misconception of the roles of the various parties in the distribution of this. The original agreement about the purposes for which this money may be used was made some time ago, and the decision about whether or not any particular project meets the relevant criteria set down in the agreement falls to Wealden District Council. Once they have agreed that a project is within the remit, then it is down to the Parish to decide which of the compliant proposals would be preferred. So far, four proposals have been made, for extending cricket nets, for installing a tennis court, for upgrading the children's play area and for extending the Village Hall. The first three of those have been approved by Wealden, and therefore will be able to be put forward for consideration. Sadly, the Village Hall project was turned down by WDC as it does not meet the pre-established criteria. For the avoidance of doubt, I would re-iterate that this is not a decision within the Parish Council's remit, it is one made by WDC on the basis of pre-established requirements.

The second issue I wanted to mention is planning. Central (Westminster) Government sets down a housing policy and passes to district councils an instruction covering the number of dwellings they are required to build, to help alleviate the shortage of housing in certain areas which has built up over many previous years. (Without examining the records of previous governments, let's just say it is a problem that has been steadily growing.) The District Councils then draw up a Local Plan, which specifies where, when and how many dwellings will be constructed. Wealden District Council are writing a local plan; however, it has been delayed yet again, from this month until (earliest) first quarter 2017. That creates a period of limbo, where nobody knows what development will be allowed and what will not, leading to a suspicion that Councils (because we are not unique here) may be tempted to use that period to help their overall numbers, before the plans are finalised. The Parish Council has raised this with District and County Councillors - at our regular meetings - and I, on behalf of the Parish Council, have taken the issue up with our MP, Nus Ghani.

I suspect that the majority of residents of Isfield understand the need for development; indeed, the schemes that have been built appear to blend happily with the existing stock of the village. However, I feel it only fair to point out the current unsatisfactory position. I know several other villages in Wealden share our concerns, not least because of the growing strain on infrastructure, particularly the road network, where it is difficult to understand how the A22, A26, A27 or A272 can handle much more traffic.

Finally, on a mixed note, I am pleased to say that the Boundary Commission accepted our case to remain in the same local government ward, with Fletching and Piltdown. Sadly, though, they did not accept that Little Horsted should also be kept in that ward, and, as it stands,

that parish will move to Ridgewood, which is an unsatisfactory result, and frankly counter-intuitive, given the many connections between Isfield and Little Horsted.

LITTLE HORSTED CHURCH OF ENGLAND SCHOOL

The Early Years Village including our Nursery at Little Horsted C.E. School

At the start of the autumn term we welcomed our sixteen new reception children to Rabbit Class and the school. Mrs Cottrell says that they have all settled in very well to life at Little Horsted.

Our Early Years Village opened in September 2016 and includes our Nursery Robins Class for children, aged three and four years old. We are able to offer up to 15 places to children in Foundation Stage 1 (age 3 to 4 year olds) for the following session each week:

Mon—Fri 8.45 - 11.45 (half-day AM)
 8.45 - 12.25 (half-day AM with lunch)
 11.45 - 12.25 (Lunchtime)
 12.25 - 3.25 (Half-day PM)
 8.45 - 3.25 (All day)

Nursery children may attend our Breakfast Club from 7.55 a.m. Please contact the school or look at the website to find out more information. The number of children in our Robins Nursery Class continues to grow and we would be delighted to welcome new children and their families to the school. School and Community Events

The children have enjoyed many school and community events this term including the official opening of our Nursery with the Mayor Linda Eastwood, Father John Wall, Governors and our

invited guests. The Rabbit Class children took our visitors on a tour of the Early Years Village and photographs were taken of the event for the local papers.

The children, as a result of a vote held by the School Council, have supported fund raising for the RNLI this term. They had a talk in assembly from a member of the RNLI and have encouraged the filling of a yellow RNLI welly boot with loose change. The older children in Mrs Pepper and Mrs Levy's Owl Class have enjoyed learning about Shakespeare through studying Macbeth. They have also learned about the Spanish Armada and the Mary Rose as part of their historical learning journey into Tudor times and explorations. They recently enjoyed a visit to the Mary Rose exhibition and found out what it might have been like to live and work on a Tudor galleon.

The children in Mr Barnes' Badgers Class (Yr 3 and 4) have loved their learning journey focus on Whizz, Bang, Pop a science focused learning journey. They are now finding out about World War 1. On the first day back after half-term they were encouraged by a rather severe Sergeant Major (Mr Barnes) to sign up to be soldiers. Their first task was to learn how to march and respond to orders!

Meanwhile the Hedgehog Class have been finding out about food, drink and healthy eating. They organised and ran an amazing Hedgehog Class Café for the parents at the end of Term 1. They are now learning about World War 1 with Badger Class.

Hedgehog Class and Rabbit Class will be performing 'Born in a Barn' their seasonal nativity play, towards the end of this term. These performances by our very youngest children are always thoroughly enjoyed by parents, grandparents and friends of the school.

The PTFA provided the BBQ at the Isfield Bonfire and Fireworks. They have organised a film night and a disco for the children. The PTFA kindly raise funds to support the resources available to the children in school. Recently, they have raised funds for ICT and science equipment and resources for the children to use during outdoor playtimes.

Father John and Father Mitch have led many enjoyable Wednesday morning assemblies and our special Harvest church service which was held in St Michael and All Angels Church on Friday 18 October. Mrs Pepper's drama club presented the story of Tattybogle (a scarecrow) to the congregation and the children sang wonderfully throughout the story and the service. Father John thoroughly enjoyed his first service in church with the school. His first assembly was immensely enjoyed by the children as well, particularly as he tried to make a cake, but obviously didn't know how to do this correctly, for example he threw the egg shells in with his cake mix! His message (following the right path through the teaching of the Bible) of course was very strong and clearly understood by the children at the end of a very funny and enjoyable assembly.

What Purpose does a Governing Body have?

The role of a school governor is to ensure high standards of achievement for all children in the school by setting the school's vision, ethos and strategic direction, holding the head teacher to account for the educational performance of the school and its pupils, as well as overseeing the financial performance of the school and making sure its money is well spent.

A Background to Little Horsted School Governors

We have a very strong and cohesive governing body, with a diverse skill set from a group of people, who are bound together by the common aim of striving for the best for our school. Different aspects of our local community are represented by different governors. Many of us, like myself, have close ties with the school and some of the governing body have parental or grandparent links to the school. This academic year, we are pleased to welcome two new parent governors Paul Boxall and Gail Gillon. We thank them for their time and services. We are also delighted to welcome Reverend John Wall, the new Rector.

As governors, we undertake regular training to enable us to fulfill our role to the highest possible standard. In recent years, training has included Ofsted preparation, updates on academy status for schools, PREVENT agenda in schools (child protection) delivered by Sussex Police and data analysis. Child protection training is ongoing, completed promptly and swiftly and given the highest priority. Our designated child protection governor is Dr. Chevassut. Paul Boxall also advises on this, along with health and safety, drawing on his expertise and working knowledge as a secondary school Head. Laura Woods is the governor responsible for Health and Safety within the school. This year, amongst other issues, we will be undergoing training and guidance concerning governor, staff and pupil use of social media. This will entail looking at the benefits of social media in promoting both learning as well as promoting the works of the school within the community.

Church Information

As a church school, we value the close connections we have with our two parishes, Isfield and Little Horsted. The school works closely with the local churches and values the unswerving

input and support of our two churches in practical and spiritual terms. We are pleased to support the St Michael and All Angels restoration fundraising effort. The restoration of the church will benefit the school both directly and indirectly, enabling more joint events to take place as well as the children of the school being able to use the church on a more regular basis. If you have any further questions on this restoration programme, please contact Mrs Laura Woods, our Church Governor.

Our end of term Christmas service at St Michael and All Angels Church is on Wednesday 21 December. The school will attend the Christingle Service at St Michael and All Angels Church, Little Horsted on Sunday 15 January at 11.00 a.m.

2016 has seen ups and downs at the Village Hall. On a positive note we are delighted that bookings for adult and children's parties, and for societies' meetings, social evenings, fundraisers and AGMs, have increased this year. We have received very positive feedback from users about our beautiful hall. We strive to ensure that making a booking is simple and straightforward (see end of our section for details).

More good news includes the on-going success of Isfield Art Group which meets on Thursday afternoons and continues to grow in membership; Jane Will's wonderful floral workshops; the successful craft workshops run throughout the year by Adele Scantlebury's Blackbird Arts; the popular Tai Chi classes run on Monday afternoons; the very enjoyable Charleston classes run by Helen of Brighton Boogie on Tuesday evenings; and the steadily growing Isfield Wine Society evenings run bi-monthly.

Our own Village Hall events have been well supported, solid fundraisers in a year when our maintenance costs have increased due to floor maintenance and a new back door. In March we held an Open Day to showcase the clubs and societies that regularly use the village hall and we plan to do this again in 2017 (see upcoming events below). We also held two very enjoyable Race Night events with buffet suppers. We had an experienced MC/compere, a computerised tote system, race cards, advance sale of each of the horses in the first 7 races and an auction of the horses in the last race, a selection of flat and hurdle races, and all races were shown on DVD. We thank Andy Brooks for his support and help with these events. Finally we close the year with our fabulous Frost Fair which is even bigger and better this year; we could not run this Christmas fair without the help and support of our

wonderful volunteers, 'manning' stalls, running the catering, providing cakes and raffle prizes, running the raffle and setting up and cleaning up afterwards. They have our very sincere thanks.

On the downside, this year we lost our Yoga classes, as Grace now runs her Thursday evening class at a local leisure venue. We also lost our film shows, as Filmspot and the Village Hall couldn't continue to run film shows at a loss. Low attendance numbers, apart from our small group of regular supporters who we thank most sincerely for their loyalty, indicated that the village doesn't want this service anyway. So it was 'use it or lose it' time, and it's a pity, as anyone who has attended will attest to the high quality of these shows. We thank Filmspot for the high quality of the shows and their loyalty.

The Remembrance Celebrations, which preceded the lighting of the bonfire, with "The Last Post" played and giant poppies glowing red before the field fell into two minutes silence, was moving enough to make me quite teary as I write this now.

On a more practical note the hedges have been cut and, as funds are relatively healthy, ICE have been able to instigate a regular programme of mowing. This means that in future we will be less reliant on the goodwill of Members, who have always been there for us, despite the inconvenience to their lives and businesses; and, I shall never again have to watch, while sheltering under a leaky tent, as Lincoln Cranfield mows the field in a tropical downpour in preparation for the Fete.

We have also decided to add an extra fresh water tap, as an improvement to the CL, which will negate the necessity of our caravaners plodding through our wet patch if we ever have another winter like the last. One final piece of news with regard to the afore-mentioned leaky tent; the old Village Marquee was, despite peoples' best efforts, beyond repair. And so in partnership with the Fete, we have purchased a new one from Barkers of Godstone. Our contribution is in the form of a loan, which the Fete will pay back over time, as funds permit. It is both tough and draft free, as anyone who attended our Film Night will testify. It should last us all many years and I hope it meets with your approval. Have a happy and peaceful Christmas.

ST MARGARET'S CHURCH

The Rev'd John Wall is the Uckfield plurality's new Rector and we are delighted to welcome him to our church and village. He comes to us from Moulseccomb, on the edge of Brighton, where for ten years he was Team Rector and, amongst many other things, heavily involved in opening a cooperative community pub. He has spent most of his ministry in Sussex and it is surely more than a coincidence that his first post was Curate of St Margaret's, Ifield. He is looking forward to becoming, as far as possible, part of our community. The children at Little Horsted Primary School already know what fun he is through his assemblies. We all wish him, and his faithful Labrador, Sophie, a long, fulfilling and enjoyable time with us. We are so lucky to have such an inspiring minister to lead us.

The get-together of the Friends of St Margaret's was held at The Old House during September when Frank Fox-Wilson and Peter Willson entertained us with their music. This annual event is a small thank you to the Friends for their generous donations which are so important to the church. Very many of the Friends are not regular churchgoers and several are non-churchgoers but they all recognise the value of this centuries old institution to our community. Thank you to everyone for their generosity.

The two-day Harvest Flower Festival in October was a great event which was enjoyed by many villagers and outsiders alike. The church was full with wonderful floral arrangements made by many individuals and organisations, including the Pre-School's flower-filled wellington boots! Thank you to everyone involved and especially Cariena Cartwright and Penny Martin who decided it was time for such an event, did all the planning for it and ensured that it was such a success.

It was particularly fitting that the church was full the next day for a memorial service for Pam Cooper. She had been in charge of the church flowers and also a member of the PCC for nearly twenty years. How appropriate that, entirely coincidentally, the church was full of flowers for the service to celebrate her life.

Rev'd John Wall's first morning service in St Margaret's happened to be two days before the 400th anniversary of Nicholas Culpeper's birth on 18th October 1616. The Rev'd John spoke about Culpeper who is revered for his book, *The Complete Herbal*, which is said to be the most successful non-religious English text still in print. He grew up in Isfield where his grandfather, Rev'd William Attersole, was the rector. Nicholas's father had died just days before he was born, in Surrey, and his mother was forced to return to her parents where she had been married. Grandfather Attersole would have been tutor to some of the Shurley children immortalised in the alabaster monument in the church's chapel named after that family. Nicholas produced his famous book two years before he died in 1654. He had devoted his life to the poor living in Spitalfields and wrote his book specifically to help those who could not afford the services of a doctor. He is remembered in the village by the newish Culpeper Close.

When you are next in the church do have a look at the Shurley monument and also look up at the church's massive roof beams. On one of them you will see "Ano Dom 1558" carved. It is salutary to realise that the beams were probably put up during Culpeper's grandfather's time.

It was particularly pleasing to see St Margaret's so full on Remembrance Sunday when wreaths were laid at the war memorial by representatives of seven village organisations on the war memorial for the seventeen villagers who were killed in the Great

War and five in the Second World War. After the service, led by Canon Hugh Mosely, wreaths were laid on the war commission gravestones of three villagers. One of them, Arthur Gurr, was a distant relative of the wife of our postman Michael and so it was fitting that she laid the wreath in his memory.

You may have noticed that part of the churchyard wall has been damaged, apparently deliberately, by someone driving into it in a vehicle of some sort. We hope that the extensive repairs will be carried out early in the New Year. It is good to know that many villagers and others walk their dogs from the church carpark - can you please keep an eye open and let one of us know if you see any odd goings on!

Now looking forward to Christmas. Our traditional village Carol service will be on the 18th December at 6.00 pm. On Christmas Eve there will be a Midnight Communion service which will start at 11.30 pm. On Christmas Morning a Family service of Carols will start at 10 o'clock followed by Holy Communion for those who want it. We look forward to welcoming as many of you as possible to some, if not all, of these services.

We are still without our own curate. The priority for 2017 must be to find someone to live in the village, lead our services, take on the pastoral work in our community and help the overburdened clergy in Uckfield. Let us hope that after three years we will at last be successful.

Just a reminder, our Sunday services are at 10 o'clock with Holy Communion on the 1st, 3rd and 5th Sundays, Matins on the 2nd and a Family service on the 4th. We do hope that you, especially newcomers both in Lavender Fields and elsewhere in the parish, will join us during 2017.
