LITTLE HORSTED CHURCH OF ENGLAND SCHOOL

I thought I would include in this newsletter some of the history linked to some of the permanent icons, gifts and art-work at Little Horsted CE School.

I started my post as headteacher of Little Horsted CE School on 18 April 1994 having been appointed by the governors of the school at that time, who included Canon Bill Peters, Cllr Jim Fordham, Mr John Sonsthagen, Mrs Shirley Dalling, Mrs Angie Dawson and Mr Norman Woods. Mrs Freda Stephenson who was the deputy headteacher, retired in the July of that year and as a leaving gift to mark her 21 years at the school she gave a lovely wooden carving created by the artist Michael Cruickshank, to the school.



The carving has been part of the school fabric ever since, and can be found in the entrance area just inside our Nursery classroom. The carving depicts the school logo which is a picture of the lych gate with St Michael and All Angels Church, behind.

In 1996 when Canon Bill Peters retired as Rector of the plurality, he gave a framed calligraphy version of the Little Horsted School Prayer. This can be found in the hall next to the door.



In 2002 following the completion of the Phase 1 building programme two etched windows were installed near



In 2007 Mel Howse was commissioned to create a rainbow glass window to fit between these two windows. The rainbow window marks the completion of the Phase 2 building programme (our new Year 5/6 classroom and the ramp and steps).



In 2005 as part of our 150th birthday celebrations a rainbow mosaic was created by all the members of the Little Horsted School community. The mosaic depicts both the churches of St Michael and All Angels, Little Horsted and St Margarets,

Isfield. It shines a rainbow of light over the children and the educational learning activities that are taking place in the school.



Our wall of bricks in the entrance, indicates the names of friends of the school who have helped with our various fund raising initiatives over the years.

In 2012, following the completion of the new hall, kitchen and ICT suite, Father Frank Fox Wilson carved a cross with animals, to mark the opening of the new hall. It can be found on the north wall of the hall.



In 2012 when Mrs Angela Hook retired, she gave a hand-woven tapestry of the dedication prayer, spoken by the Bishop during the service for the opening of the school hall.

Mrs Rhian Cottrell (Deputy Headteacher) retired in April 2017. As a gift to the children and the school she gave a lovely 'Storytelling Chair', which sits proudly on our school field facing the South Downs. The children and adults love to sit and reflect on this chair during their free times.



As I retire this Easter, I decided to give a playground car to the children as my leaving gift. I love the way that the very youngest children run into the playground each day, eager and ready to learn and I felt that the car would provide yet another draw for the children to learn and enjoy their time at the school.

Church information

I always say to our Year 6 children at their leavers' service each year, "that you should try to leave a place better than you find it." I feel that this has been achieved at the school by many people during the time that I have been the headteacher.

I feel immensely privileged and lucky to have been part of such an amazing school for the last twenty-five years. The children are incredibly well taught by a dedicated group of teachers and support staff. The children achieve high standards in their attainment across the school. They are extremely well-behaved which is a tribute to the whole staff team who look after them each day. The children are happy and contented and enjoy coming to school each day.

I should like to thank all of you for your care, love and support for the school over many years. It has been greatly appreciated by the children, the staff, the governors, the parents and myself.

If anyone sees a glow worm up there please tell me, it's an ambition of mine to see the little Devils in the field. They've become increasingly rare in the village since the grass around the level crossing has been kept short right up to the hedge-line. Fortunately, they can still be found in a field not so far away - so fingers crossed.

Last summer was a bumper year for our tiny caravan site. From memory we were 26% up on bookings by the end of August. Unfortunately, the autumn, during which we expect good usage, was for some unknown reason very poor, bringing overall bookings for the year down to the same levels as the very wet season we had a year or two ago. But we still made a healthy profit, so you'll hear no complaints from us. Many thanks as usual to Linda, for all her diligence with the bookings.

The landscaping of the entrance is still on going. A post and rail fence should appear soon and as the nettles have been sprayed off our planting can begin. Native dogwood, which can be cut to produce strong red stems for the winter are to be under planted with snow drops and celandines and we are looking at perhaps adding something else for either high summer or autumn. An English Oak, Service Tree and Crab Apple should also make debts in other parts of the field.

ISFIELD PARISH **COUNCIL**

On the last Monday of March, the current Parish Council held its last meeting. The date for the election of new councillors is 2nd May, and all residents, who are on the electoral roll, will be able to cast their votes for the election of those new councillors. At least, that's how it should be. In fact, the likelihood is that the number of candidates will not exceed the number of vacancies, thus rendering the casting of votes superfluous. I base that statement on the precedent of the last several elections, and in the knowledge that one councillor is stepping down; there may, of course, be several new candidates putting themselves forward, and I would hope that is the case, but experience suggests it may not be. Anyway, the new council will take office after the election, and the May meeting will be its first. I would just like to record here my thanks to the outgoing councillors for their support and their efforts over the last four years.

Efforts by residents at least as much as by the Council seems finally to have persuaded the ESCC highways department

that they cannot continue simply to ignore the issue of the dangers of traffic speed along Rose Hill (A26) and we are working with them to set up a speed monitoring test; with the evidence from that, we shall see what measures may be taken.

The plans for the use of Section 106 money to improve the amenities of the recreation ground are moving forward, and the consultants' plans and suggestions have now been received and discussed by the Council.

I would again take the opportunity to urge residents to come to PC meetings if they have issues they wish to raise. The Council may or may not be able to resolve them, depending on their exact nature, but there is more chance of action if we are made aware formally of things than if we are not.
