UPDATE FROM THE LOCAL MP

The last couple of months has certainly been a hectic time in Westminster! A majority of the British electorate has voted for the United Kingdom to leave the European Union. Our country is now presented with a unique opportunity, and we must make sure to take the entire population on this journey in a calm and measured way, united in confidence and hope for the future. The new Prime Minister, Teresa May, will have the critical responsibility of doing this while delivering the public's will.

However, the task of standing up for local issues always continues. During the last few weeks I've been closely following steps being taken to solve the problems with patient transport services throughout the county, and I've helped the Uckfield & District Lions Club secure their new community minibus, I have received numerous postcards regarding funding for community pharmacies, as well as a petition containing several hundred local signatures. As a result of this, I personally met with the Minister for Social Care, Alistair Burt, to hand this petition to him, and as the Government continues to consult on this very important issue, I will continue to follow it closely and ensure that the concerns of local people are clearly heard.

Following my repeated calls over a period of more than a year, the Transport Select Committee has finally summoned executives from Govia Thameslink Railway to answer questions about the performance of Southern. I have been keeping members of the Committee fully updated, so that they are fully able to ask about Southern's long-term failure to provide a standard of service that is acceptable to passengers. The General Secretary of the RMT Union, which I hold responsible for the current industrial dispute and the increased and wholly unacceptable level of resulting disruption, will also appear before the Committee. This is a positive step. and I hope that the Committee asks searching questions to hold those responsible to account.

I have a lot of good news to report! I was delighted to join students from Beacon Academy in Crowborough as they were awarded a Speaker's School Council Award by the Speaker of the House of Commons. It is one of only four schools across the country to win the award. The awards honour the most

<u>ISFIELD</u> VILLAGE HALL

The village hall is a very popular local venue for family parties of all kinds but it's been a good few years since we've had a wedding at the hall, so Brenda Reynolds, our Bookings Manager, is thrilled to report that a wedding celebration has been booked for September. In July a hirer who held her joint 18th birthday at the hall booked the hall again for her 40th birthday; a delightful example of continuity of use. Booking details for the village hall are at the end of this update.

Floor maintenance takes place on August 9th and 10th and we are replacing the back kitchen door with a white composite door with storm guard and threshold.

Due to relatively low numbers attending our film shows, Filmspot can no longer continue to run them with us. We thank Filmspot for the quality of the shows, and for being a joy to work with. A survey of the village in 2015 put film shows as the top choice for events that people would like to attend in the village hall, but we have only had large audiences for a couple of films. Many of our loyal regulars will miss the films but, despite all the positive comments, and attempts to promote the events widely, we have failed to draw a large enough audience, so we do have to call it a day now, with much regret.

At the Isfield Parish Council (IPC) meeting held on 24th March 2016 we presented a succinct, serious and substantial submission under the Millwood Homes development's Section 106 for funding of £80,000 (i.e. approx. 50% of the £167,509.52 available under the Sec. 106) towards the costs of building an extension to the back of the village hall (for an extra events room, a disabled toilet and storage) and to update existing facilities such as the kitchen. We believe that improvements to the hall are essential for a growing community, that we have strong support in the village (evidenced in the survey of the village that we ran in 2015, and, more recently, by positive, written comments we received from over 65 residents at our Open Day in March) and that the Sec. 106 offers an unique opportunity for village improvements.

We were informed by IPC that our submission was not successful as the Sec.106 funds are for 'open space' initiatives, and not for community hall improvements. We sought clarification from Wealden District Council as 'open space' doesn't appear anywhere in the Sec. 106 and were informed that all the funds were for 'a children's play area.' We asked Wealden how the 'youth and adult' category in the Sec. 106 fitted a 'children's play area.' Wealden have now informed us that this category covers facilities such as playing fields. Whilst our priorities are the maintenance of the village hall and its on-going financial stability, eventually we hope to attain funding elsewhere to improve our much used and valued village hall.

During the school summer holidays **Isfield Play Scheme** runs every week day from 25th July to 4th August in the village hall. Play Scheme is organised and facilitated by Sean and Carole Ring, contact details 01825 760959.



A little bit of Isfield history.....

An old map of Isfield dated 1899



The description of the village on record is -

"Isfield is a parish and a village on the River Ouse in the East Grinstead division of Sussex, in the hundred of Loxfield Dorset, rape of Pevensey, rural deanery of Uckfield, archdeaconry of Lewes and diocese of Chichester. It is 44 miles south of London".

The map shows a number of original properties which still exist, although not working farms or smithy any more, shows where the paper mill and school were and some properties which have now changed their name for example the Independent Chapel. In 1841 I THINK the main road through the village was known as the High Street and in the 1881 census there was an Isfield Street.

In the 1891 census Isfield had a population of 423. Over the years more houses have been built along the main road through Isfield plus the estates of Northfield Cottages and Tile Barn Close so by the census of 2011 Isfield's population had grown to 574. No doubt this will be boosted again when Lavender Fields is completed.

<u>ISFIELD PARISH</u> <u>COUNCIL</u>

Summer finally seems to have arrived, and with it the campers and picnickers along the bank of the river. While it's always good to see people

- mostly in this case I guess from outside the village - enjoying the peaceful attractions of our Parish, I don't believe I'm the only one who has noticed the amount of debris - used barbecues, plastic bags of rubbish - left lying on the bank after a sunny weekend. I would like to be able to offer some solution to this littering, but I'm afraid it's outside the powers of the Parish Council. Jim Smith and Ron Harrington do a sterling job of picking litter through the village, but, splendid though their efforts are, it's difficult to keep ahead of the litterers. I can't provide an answer to the

problem, but perhaps we should all be prepared to do our bit of clearing.

The main issue that the Parish Council has had to respond to this half year has been the proposed Boundary Commission changes to Ward boundaries. The response that we made to the Commission is available on the website: we proposed what we believe is a more satisfactory solution to the required change than that originally outlined. I'm pleased to say that we were able to work constructively together with the Parishes of Fletching and Little Horsted (both of which were also adversely affected by the original change) and between the three Parishes we were able to agree a similar response. We will not know until some time in September if our representations have been heeded, but I am confident that we have made a cogent, coherent case for our alternative solution. I would like to thank all those Parishioners who also made individual representations to the Boundary Commission about the unsuitability of their initial proposal. We are assured by the Commission that individual, personal responses will be given a significant weighting.

I understand that the debate over the Brighton Main Line 2 is hotting up. The consensus view appears to be that there is a fair chance that the development will go ahead - although there has as yet been no decision - which will ultimately mean a discussion within the village about whether or not a station would be welcome. We are far from needing to have that discussion yet, but I do think it is worth beginning to think about.

Your local First Responding Team has sadly become depleted with Bev and Jim Ashford withdrawing from the scheme because of the conflict between their

travel commitments and being able to devote enough free time to give sufficient hours of availability to the Ambulance Service. They have been very loyal and supportive Responders and I would like to thank them for their help in getting the scheme off the ground at its inception in Isfield, and for securing initial funding for their medical kits and defibrillator. The intention is for this spare defibrillator to be placed somewhere central in the village and designated a 'Public Access Defibrillator' for immediate availability in the case of a cardiac arrest.

The period ahead will be very busy with ever increasing demands upon the Ambulance Service and it would be good if we can get another CFR in the Isfield area. If you are over eighteen, in good general health and would like to give some of your free time to being a Volunteer Responder, please contact either myself or visit the SECAmb website. You will be trained in frontline emergency situations when you are often first on scene and the vital link providing lifesaving treatment in the period before an ambulance can attend. Training takes place over a period of months during which time new skills are taught at each session, so that the incidents to which you are able to respond are gradually extended. In addition there are monthly training and discussion meetings as well as an annual field day, and you will also be required to gain additional experience by completing full shifts in an ambulance or in a response car.

ST MARGARET'S CHURCH

We are looking forward to a number of exciting events in

the autumn but first we must look back to two in the past. Peter and Jenny Holmes organised a fundraising summer tea party in their garden. Lots of villagers enjoyed scones with strawberries and cream followed by a great variety of cakes. It was a lovely time for everyone and a marvellous way to raise funds for the church; thank you to them.

The second is to John and Margaret Lomas for whom the village and church have much to thank. They lived in the Birches Farm back in the 1930s and gave the village the land which is now the Recreation Ground and also a Village Hall which stood near the Lavender Cottages. It fell into disrepair but when the Village School closed in 1970 the Hall Management Committee sold the old hall site and used the £4,000 it raised to buy the School and convert it into our Village Hall. Mr Lomas died in 1962 and Mrs Lomas moved to Lewes. More than 25 years later she died but she had not forgotten Isfield and, to everyone's great surprise and pleasure, left a bequest which has helped to ensure that the church has been well maintained and major works carried out.

The Lomas Cottages, which adjoin the Recreation Field, ensure that the Lomas name is not forgotten in the village. In the church, the P.C.C. decided in 1982 that there should be a memorial to Margaret Lomas and raised funds for an oak altar in the Shurley Chapel. At that time the majority of services were held in the main church for a relatively small congregation and the Chapel was rarely used. But now, after a project of installing a lighting and simple heating system, it is used for the majority of services with the Margaret Lomas altar as its centre. At a service in early July the altar was rededicated to her with sincere thanks for her great beguest. John and Margaret Lomas will not be forgotten.

Now to the future:

The Friends of St Margaret's Church are not just regular and occasional churchgoers but many others in the village who recognise the value of the church to the community not only as a building for weekly worship.


